- -There is a new Captain for District 1; his name is Chad Williams. As captain for our patrol division, he is responsible for long-term problem solving. Long-term problems can be categorized as issues that are problematic by their nature or problem locations or hot spots requiring a long-term response or well-coordinated, multi-faceted response.
- -All neighborhoods reported successful National Night Out celebrations we had perfect weather and such a fun time at our NNO at Lindley Pool. I hope many of you were there to enjoy the evening. Please contact me if you have suggestions for next year's NNO I would appreciate any & all feedback.
- -As usual, a spate of car break-ins resulted in reminders to LOCK OUR CARS & TAKE VALUABLES INSIDE
- -There has been an uptick in aggravated assaults in Greensboro, many taking place at apartment complexes. GPD are using hot spot policing (increasing their presence & number of officers in the troubled areas) and using special groups of officers to serve warrants & apprehending known offenders to address these assaults
- -The recently reported robbery at the Friendly Center Barnes & Noble has taken a turn and is not considered a random attack and perhaps was not a robbery at all...but still be aware of your surroundings
- -Safety tips from Officer Wingfield:
- ***Be aware of your surrounding while out, if you notice that you are being followed, do not drive to your residence, drive to a police station or a public area and call 911
- *** when unloading things into your car, put your purse into the car first, then unload your items
- ***listen to your gut and stay safe
- ***if bushes, vines, or trees have over grown signs for your street or house number, trim them emergency personnel need to see the signs for fastest response

Update on St. Andrew's Episcopal Church going green project.

We have:

- Changed all of our lighting to LED lights which use far less electricity than incandescent or even fluorescent bulbs.
- Installed electronic governing systems on five out of six of our air conditioning systems. These controls reduce the use of electricity, provide more efficient cooling, and actually extend the life of the equipment. (The sixth system cannot be updated at the current time.)
- Installed wifi-enabled timed thermostats to reduce our use of HVAC systems when we don't need them.
- Applied for permission and are actively engaged in attempting to install solar panels on the roof in order to reduce our use of fossil fuels.
- Actively committed to reduce our use of disposable paper and plastic utensils, plates, and cups by using reusable products wherever possible.

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Moravian Bands – Past and Present By Chip Cook

If you live just a few blocks from the corner of Elam Avenue and Sylvan Street, you have probably heard the sounds of a brass band, more than likely during the first weekend of December, or perhaps very early on Easter Sunday morning in the spring. Like many Moravian congregations found in abundance in Winston-Salem (and in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania), Greensboro's first and only Moravian Church band highlights important events in the life of the church and its congregation throughout the year.

ORIGINS OF THE BAND

The Moravian congregation of Salem, now known as Home Church, was organized in November 1771. The first set of trombones arrived at the church in 1772. Trumpets and other brass instruments were added by 1850, and by the 20th century, woodwind instruments including clarinets, saxophones and flutes joined the band. The function of the band was to play at special outdoor events, worship services, and to announce the death of congregant members of the church. In fact, the band would play special music to announce the death of an adult male, female, as well as child. Even married status, or as a single man, woman or widow or widower, was signified to the community through the selected music.






Throughout the history of the Moravians in America, it is clear that men, women, boys and girls took music lessons on keyboard, brass-wind and other instruments. Music education and musical performance was integral in the lives of the early Moravians. Moravians still regard music as an essential and necessary part of life, adding to cultural value, as well as expression and development of religious life.

Following the early church teachings of singing in a 4-part harmony, symbolizing the equality of all in the eyes of God, the Moravian Band chorales were written in a soprano, alto, tenor and bass arrangement. The written music is shared with other Protestant denominations (especially Lutherans and Methodists), but a large number of the traditional chorales of the band are

uniquely Moravian in origin and usage. For example, the Christmas carol, "Morning Star," written as a poem in 1657 by Johannes Scheffler, was musically composed by Moravian Francis F. Hagen, in Salem, in 1836.











TODAY'S BAND

The Moravian band of our century continues to perform for special outdoor occasions, celebrations, worship services, and continues the announcement of deaths of congregants of the church. The bands still fulfill their outdoor role, but have also been invited inside, and this takes many different forms in the various congregations, from solo instrument with organ to brass or woodwind quartet/quintets; from band accompaniment of hymns, to anthems with a wide variety of instruments.



Local to Forsyth County and surrounding communities, there is a special events and funeral band. Made up of members from over a dozen Moravian congregations, these musicians volunteer weekly and are called by email to play for activities and at graveside funerals. For Easter, the bands from all the Winston-Salem congregation churches and many others in the area, play "rounds" throughout the W-S city neighborhoods at about 2:00am to announce Easter morning and the resurrection of Christ. Assembling in Salem at sunrise for the Easter Service, the merged band of over 300-400 instrumentalists performs at "God's Acre," with a portion of the music played antiphonally. Home Church in Salem also provides free music education programs (beginning band) during the year for children and adults to help ensure future bands will exist for the church and community.

SUNSET HILL'S MORAVIAN BAND



First Moravian Church's band, consisting of brass and woodwind instruments, performs throughout the calendar year. However, December and March or April (depending on when Easter arrives) are the most active periods, with several performances to mark Candle Tea (Moravian "open house") and the Holy days leading up to Christmas and Easter. The band consists of adults and teenagers and is open to any person willing to practice and play with enthusiasm and enjoyment.

Following in the tradition of a young non-Moravian, Andy Griffith of later "Mayberry" fame, who played trombone at Grace Moravian Church in Mt. Airy, First Moravian Band welcomes any member of the community to join our band on

brass or woodwind instruments. Please contact band leader Chuck Royster, by email, at chuck.royster@gmail. com. We would love to have you (and if you didn't know, we also have cookies).


Lighted Christmas Ball Making Party



As a young girl, Tami Williams had always wanted a white cat and she even wrote about one that won best short story in the county for her grade. Her wish came true many years later as an adult when a stray happened upon her parents' land in Ether, NC. Her parents already had two cats when they sent a photo of this gorgeous white cat lying in the fall leaves. Tami said she couldn't get him out of her mind and worried about the coyotes in the area. She was mourning the passing of her cat that died five months earlier. It seemed destined for "Snowflake" to come to Sunset Hills to live with her and her husband, Jeff. Tami said that Snowflake already knew her from her visits to Ether and he jumped right in the bed the first night. He had scars on his ears from fighting, but when Tami found a bump on his back, she had a gut feeling that something was really wrong and she was right. The vet at Carolina Veterinary Specialists said that getting him seen so quickly probably saved his life. Snowflake had an infected abscess that required surgery and had spread to his abdomen, but luckily not to other organs. Those first two weeks with a cone on his little head to protect his stitches was hard for everyone, but the little breaks of "cuddle" time made Snowflake happy and despite the odds, he recovered and became a loving indoor pet.

Later, a vet suggested they get a friend for Snowflake and along came a tiny little kitty, Bucky, who was almost two months old. He was a stray that someone found beside a dumpster and fostered. He was very smart and friendly and everyone at the vet's office loved him. Tami texted a photo to Jeff, who immediately texted back, "I think you should bring him home." She did and said Bucky was jumping up the walls and still has a lot of energy. Tami had planned to keep Snowflake and Bucky separated for two weeks, but after a week, she and Jeff decided to let them hang out together. She said that Snowflake was very gentle with Bucky and gave him light warning bites. Tami said they are both very lovable and thankful to be indoor cats. Like most rescues, they know

they have a great life.



PROPOSE. VOTE. BUILD. PBGREENSBORO PBGreensboro.com

It is time to vote for district 4 participatory projects. Participatory budgeting (PB) was approved by Greensboro City Council in October 2014 and is now in its 3rd cycle. Previous cycle completed district 4 projects include the recently installed Walker Ave bridge railing and the Elam/Camden cross-walk. PB is a democratic process where Greensboro residents decide how to spend City budgeted funds (\$100,000 per district). Residents come up with ideas, volunteers turn those ideas into projects that get vetted by the city and then approved projects are voted on by residents (14 years of age or older). Residents can only vote on projects in their assigned districts.

Voting started September 7th with a kickoff campaign at the NC Folk Festival. Online voting options are available this year (look for a link on PB's Facebook Page, through our email list serve, as well as the below link).

The following are the district 4 projects that were approved for voting (If you are reading this, you are likely in District 4):

- Lindley Park Pool Upgrades
 - Paint locker rooms and apply an epoxy floor coating to the floors.
- 2. Sunset Hills Park / Market St. crosswalk
 - East Greenway / Market St. increased visibility (blinking signs for drivers) and pedestrian crossing area due to the increasing amount of kid/family crossing
- 3. Our Lady of Grace Crosswalk
 - Berkley and Chapman PI as well as Sylvan and Chapman re-working signage and increase visibility of crosswalks in this area.
- 4. Sunset Hills Park Tree Clean-up
 - Removal of a handful of trees in the park due to safety concerns. Replacement of trees with new plantings
- 5. Pomona Park upgrades (2 projects)
 - Upgrade of outfield at Pomona baseball field near Rucker St. and Clifton Rd to remove the gravel from field
 - Update of the basketball hoops

Let's get out the vote and show the City that we want to continue this program. If the program continues next year, make sure to get your projects on the ideas list and, if possible, volunteer to help vet the projects.
